Summary of key humanitarian asks/needs

- Unconditional and flexible fund mobilization, including for INGOs and National NGOs.
- Specialised search and rescue teams, machinery, and equipment.
- Fast-tracked infrastructural assessment of impacted buildings, including health facilities.
- Fast-tracked safety assessment of collective shelters.
- Fast-tracked infrastructural assessment of key water installations, such as dams, reservoirs, and community tanks.
- Fast-tracked waivers for humanitarian supplies and funds.
- Family tracing and reunification for separated and unaccompanied children.
- Facilitated entry and distribution of medicines, supplies, equipment, trauma and surgical supplies, prosthetics, assistive devices, and basic first aid kits.
- Continuity of health care services, especially for women, children, elderly, persons with non-communicable diseases, including mental health and psycho-social support.
- Fuel for re-deployment of health workers, ambulance transport, search and rescue, and all humanitarian operations.
- Access to clean water.
- Reaching impacted communities in rural areas, and those internally displaced outside of collective shelters.
- Ready to eat rations/meals.
- Non-food items, core relief items and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) supplies.
- Upholding protection, gender, age, and disability considerations, as much as possible, throughout the humanitarian response, especially in collective shelters.

Food Security and Agriculture

- Ongoing provision of food assistance, including ready to eat (RTE) rations and hot meals.

Shelter and Non-Food Items

- Ongoing support to the infrastructural assessments of impacted buildings.
- Ongoing support to the safety assessments of newly established collective shelters.
- Ongoing provision of winterization items, emergency NFI items, and core relief items.
- Ongoing mobilization of support to debris removals in collaboration with the Early Recovery Sector.
- Available 19,900 tents and 19 fabric cover warehouses (which can be used for reception areas or collective
- shelters) in Damascus.

WASH

- Ongoing assessment of water points and water pumping stations.
- Ongoing provision of family hygiene kits and chlorine.
